# Annual event to be held September 25 at scenic Opus 40 in Saugerties

Philanthropy is alive and well—and will be celebrated—at the Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley's annual Garden Party. Each year for more than two decades, the Community Foundations has recognized leaders who are dedicated to improving lives through their community service and philanthropy. Proceeds from this signature event support nonprofit capacity building through the Community Response Grants program.

This year's honorees are Sue Hartshorn from Dutchess County and the Turk Family from Ulster County, including Gloria Turk and son Steve Turk and his wife, Shelley. All share a wonderful trait: a propensity for giving, both of their time and their generous donations. They can be credited with a long history of contributions to education, the arts and a range of programs and services that have improved the lives of their fellow community members.

Sue Hartshorn was born and raised in Baltimore, MD, into a family that encouraged community service. After graduating from Vassar and settling in Rhinebeck to raise her family, Sue became involved with a long list of organizations including the Rhinebeck Central School District Board, Starr Library Board, women's rights organizations and most recently Arts Mid-Hudson, the Center for Photography at Woodstock, and Art Along the Hudson. She and her family own and manage Montgomery Row in Rhinebeck, NY.

## **Putnam Meets Dyson Challenge**

#### Community Response Grants available to Putnam nonprofits August 1

The Board of Advisors for the Community Foundation of Putnam County is proud to announce that it has met the \$100,000 Dyson Foundation challenge grant. The challenge was an incentive offered by the Dyson Foundation to generate new philanthropic support in Putnam County and establish a permanent endowment fund and current grants for Putnam nonprofits through the Community Response Grants program.

This is part of an expansion of the Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley's activity in Putnam County. This year, Putnam teachers became eligible to apply for grants through the Fund for Excellence in Education, including STEM grants through the Verizon Foundation. Seven teachers from the Brewster, Carmel, Garrison and Mahopac school districts were awarded

\$11,000 in first-time education grants. Additionally, a handful of Putnam nonprofits, such as Green Chimneys and Hillside Food Outreach, have received grants through other competitive grant programs. Now, thanks to the Dyson Challenge, Putnam County nonprofits will be eligible to receive support through the Community Response Grants program for capacity and program building.

"This is truly a fund by and for the people of Putnam County. We are thrilled to be able to move forward with it," said Nathaniel S. Prentice, Chair of the Putnam County Advisory Board. The Dyson Challenge goal was met well ahead of a 2018 deadline, a clear demonstration of Putnam County residents' belief in the fund's importance to the community.

"Thanks to our donors' generosity, Putnam can now begin to offer nonprofit assistance where it is needed most while growing a permanent

legacy that will provide ongoing future support," said Nancy Rossi Brownell, Vice President for Putnam County. She also

emphasized that though the initial challenge has been met, efforts to grow the fund are ongoing and the generosity shouldn't stop. "The larger the endowment, the larger the capacity to fulfill our donors' charitable goals by putting more back into Putnam."

With support from the Cleopatra Fund, students at Green Chimneys train and care for rescued dogs to make them more adoptable as pets. Working with the dogs helps students reduce anxiety and improve emotional resilience.

In her lifetime of learning and giving back, Sue counts her affiliation with Community Foundations of Hudson Valley among her most valuable learning experiences, stating, "It has opened me to the myriad programs and organizations that the Community Foundations touches, and the needs it has addressed." In equal measure, the Community Foundations has benefitted from Sue's long involvement as a past board member and its first woman chair.

Likewise, Gloria Turk is a well-known and beloved figure at the Community Foundations' offices. Gloria and her late husband Nathan "Toolie" Turk established the Turk Family Fund as a donor advised fund in 1997. "It has been a pleasure to support the organizations I love, and have the Community Foundations act on my behalf to distribute those grants," says Gloria.
