
Mohonk Preserve Fund:

Hudson Valley Nonprofits and Schools Receive \$300,000 in Grants

Working with people like this Hyde Park homeowner, Rebuilding Together Dutchess County (RTDC) provides low-income homeowners, including seniors and veterans, with no-cost repairs, accessibility modifications and energy efficiency improvements. RTDC received a \$5,000 Community Response Grant for computer and website upgrades.

These funds support organizations that feed and clothe the hungry, offer educational opportunities and field trips, improve libraries and museums, care for animals, train staff in CPR and use of automated external defibrillators, and serve many other crucial community needs.


Dyson Challenge To Boost Putnam Grants

least \$100,000 this year, thanks to a matching challenge grant of \$100,000 from the Dyson Foundation.


"Thanks in part to significant gifts from local donors, we are close to achieving our goal," said

Among other grants, a Preserve grant to the Town of Rosendale funded a community-consensus planning process on parking nodes and access

linkages between the Wallkill Valley Rail Trail, Mohonk Preserve and downtown Rosendale. The Preserve's grant leveraged Hudson River Valley Greenway grant and a New York State Conservation Partnership grant.





Giving Stock as a Charitable Donation

Should I consider using appreciated stock for a charitable donation?

Depending on your personal tax situation*, you may find it advantageous to directly donate publicly traded appreciated securities, such as stocks, bonds and/or mutual funds that have grown over time. Because the securities are donated, rather than sold, you receive a tax deduction, avoid capital gains and the charity of your choice benefits from your generosity.

If the security was purchased more than a year ago and the current value is greater than the original cost, you can donate it to a public charity, such as the Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley. Your tax deduction could be the full fair market value of the securities, up to 30% of your adjusted gross income. The more appreciation the securities have, the greater the tax savings will be.

If the asset is not a publicly traded stock a bargain sale to the charity may still provide some tax relief and a benefit to the charity.

Tax-Wise Giving with Your IRA



In December, Congress made permanent the ability for donors who qualify to give from their individual retirement accounts (IRA) to charity, free from federal tax.

You can now "roll over" up to \$100,000 each year from your IRA directly to a qualifying charity without being taxed.

You might be able to give more with less!

You qualify if you are:

- Over 70½ and now receiving minimum IRA distributions but do not need all or some of that income.
- Interested in making a significant lifetime gift to impact your community.

Using IRA assets to give during your lifetime enables you to experience the joy of making a major gift now.
